FROM PASTOR CATIE

For Zion's sake I will not keep silent, and for Jerusalem's sake I will not rest, until her vindication shines out like the dawn and her salvation like a burning torch. The nations shall see your vindication and all the kings your glory, and you shall be called by a new name that the mouth of the LORD will give. You shall be a beautiful crown in the hand of the LORD and a royal diadem in the hand of your God."

As we begin a new year, I find myself thinking about the time after Christmas. During that final week of December, you may have traveled. You may have slowed down after the rush of the holiday and the celebrations. You may have prepared for a whole other round of celebrating as you prepared for the new year. During worship on the first Sunday after Christmas as we sat in comfort knowing that the baby Jesus was born and waited with excitement for the wisemen to arrive, we heard this reading from Isaiah. I found the artwork and the artist's reflections on this text particularly moving.

Lisle Gwynn Garrity's reflections are the following:

"When I read through Isaiah's words, I immediately visualized Mary, wrapped in a robe of righteousness, proclaiming what she knew to be true: "God has lifted up the lowly and filled the hungry with good things." Mary could not keep silent. Then I thought of the prophet Isaiah, whose fierce visions for a weary world welled up from within him: "For Jerusalem's sake, I won't sit still." He could not keep silent.

And then I thought of myself—of the times I have held back, buried my pain, avoided a hard conversation, worried about others' perceptions, or become numb to the wrongs of the world. I cannot keep silent. And yet, what I find most compelling about this passage is its particular emphasis and global reach. The prophet speaks for the sake of Zion, a city desperate to be revived. But as the prophet pursues God's dreams for his battered home and for the people he loves, the Divine Dreamer has more to grow: righteousness and praise in every nation. For the difference between a pipe dream and God's dreams is that God's dreams hold timeless and expansive power. We can't be silent because there's too much at stake. There are too many seeds in the ground, ready to spring up from the soil."

Garrity's reflection made me wonder, when am I keeping silent? Am I missing seeds that are ready to spring up?

As I sit with these questions, I plan on taking them with me into this new year as reminders. I hope you will join me.

There are times when silence is powerful and there are times when words are necessary. May we be able to know the difference and speak up when needed.

There are seeds that are ready to spring up. May we notice them. May we nurture them.

One way that I plan on intentionally wondering about these questions is through "Worship in the Wild"

"Worship in the Wild" will present opportunities in our area throughout the year to experience God in nature. It is open to all people: those in our church, those in neighboring churches, and those with no church home. How can you ponder these questions in the new year?

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Happy New Year! It is my goal for the early months of this new year to talk about Stewardship. Right away when people hear this they think of money management for the church. Or environmental concerns in managing our natural resources if talking politics, or even the treatment of the poor, neglected, and marginalized if talking about social concerns. Biblical Stewardship is all of these of course. We may disagree on many things because of the deep and enduring divisions in our society, but I think we agree on some basic points from the Bible. We have been appointed managers. The question is for whom? The Bible says we are God's managers. As early as Genesis 1, we hear God is creator and sole owner of Creation, our Universe. He then appoints us as managers. At no point does God ever give up ownership. He really does not need people to manage his estate for him. If God is powerful enough to create everything, He certainly has the ability to manage it as well. So we have a very unique calling. God has entrusted these resources to our management. Stewardship is not just about what we do; it is ultimately about who God is and who He desires us to be. No book is more important to our understanding of stewardship than Genesis. God makes it clear that He longs for us to love Him and desires for stewardship of all we are and all we have to flow from our love for Him. Please look at that last sentence again. With the risk of being redundant, take out the prepositional phrases and read it like this: God wants stewardship to flow from our love for Him. So stewardship is ultimately (there's that word again, sorry) a reflection of our relationship with the living God. These ideas are not solely mine but rather taken from the introduction to a book we are very familiar with: the Bible. So all credit goes to the authors of the introduction to the edition I am currently using. They are scholars whereas I am certainly not.

Now to some New Year's Resolutions. These are not my personal resolutions but rather some I would like all of us to consider for the new year. One being to realize when to take a step back from our duties here at Faith and allow new people to step forward to fulfill these duties. When I was coaching I was concerned that there was no one who would take over, but someone very wise told me that until I stepped aside no one would step forward. They were right. When I stepped aside someone filled my spot. The other resolution for the new year is very related to the first. When we study a situation and realize it just isn't working as it once was, be very open to trying new ideas. And many times these new ideas are coming from those who can step up and take over for us. We need to allow these new ideas to be tried and the fresh faces to become involved in all that we do here at Faith.

I leave you with one more thought: where in the world is that new constitution!!??!! I say this with the knowledge and assurance the committee is doing the best they can to get this back to us. So we look forward to this in the new year also. As always, if you have questions or concerns about anything please seek out a Church Council member.

In this new year, I announce our Synod themes for the next three years,

Last year at Synod Assembly, Seed Sowers was the theme for our inaugural Seed Sowers Luncheon that thanked people who had made a planned gift (meaning that they remembered

I think of the faithfulness of St. James in Marinette, Wi. Founded in 1918, this community of faith has been hard at work for the sake of Christ for 106 years. This past autumn, the people of St. James discerned that their last worship service will be Sunday April 14, 2024.



While this decision is difficult for all who love St. James, it also witnesses to their faithfulness. As people who believe in a God who brings new life from death and light from darkness, the work of St. James has not been in vain. This community of faith has accomplished that for which it was created and has completed that for which it was purposed. God will bring new life and growth from the seeds that St. James will plant.
