**ONLINE ONLY during OCTOBER.**


The services are uploaded to our **Facebook Pages** each weekend, and feature Scripture readings, prayers, hymns, and a sermon.

**WEEKLY MILESTONES**

Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

**CARING CONVERSATIONS**

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Describe or think about what you feel are the characteristics of a good friend.
- Are you a good friend? How would others describe you?
- How does your faith in Jesus free you to care for—even feel the pain of—others?

**DEVOTIONS**

*Read:* Philippians 3:4b-14.

We don't get it. According to research on American religious views, we want to be saved by God because we are "good people." We prefer to rely on our own merits rather than trust the power of Christ's death and resurrection that conquers our sin. Perhaps this is part of the sinful self-centeredness that Christ comes to cleanse us of. Paul writes to the church at Philippi and points out that if anyone has a claim to self-righteousness based on the law that measures our goodness, Paul would be pretty unbeatable; he would be "blameless" (v. 6). But he counts all of his religious success as "loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord" (v. 8). The truly amazing part of his testimony is that knowing Christ does not free him from suffering; he is not concerned about why "bad things happen to good people." Paul announces his freedom to suffer with Christ. This "theology of the cross" sees life in death, sees joy in suffering and sees hope in despair. Paul presses "on to make it my own" (v. 12). He is announcing a view of life, and this way of life sees Christ as the source of all our hopes of salvation. How is freedom from judging our own goodness important to our salvation?  
**Pray: Dear God, help us to know Jesus; may we focus our attention on the needs of others and to care for them through Christ our Lord. Amen.**

**SERVICE**

Grapevines and vineyards are written about more than any other plant in the Bible. They were important in Biblical times and part of the culture. They were often used as symbols of producing fruit. In this context, fruit means one's actions that come from the heart. Place grapes in a bowl and as you eat them, think about what it means for you to produce good fruits (take positive actions). What positive actions can you take to care for others?

**RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**

In Philippians 3, Paul talks about pressing towards the goal to reach the prize of knowing Christ Jesus. Think about a time you tried to reach a goal. What happened? Whether we reach the goal or not, God is always with us. **Pray: Lord, help us to keep our eye on the goal, the prize of the "heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus." Amen.**

**WEEKLY MILESTONES**

Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

**CARING CONVERSATIONS**

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Talk or think about a time you went to a party filled with friends, food, and laughter.
- Would you invite someone off the street who you do not know to a party? Why or why not?
- God's love in the Bible is seen sometimes as an invitation to a great party or feast. What does this say about God?

**DEVOTIONS**

Read: Matthew 22:1-14.

It is said we can have our own opinions, but not our own facts. Similarly, you can have your own message, but not your own Christian gospel. Matthew makes it clear that the good news of Jesus is powerful. God's mercy has the last word; it includes a divine judgment that says that the marginalized, the belittled, the "poor in spirit" (Matthew 5:3) will be blessed (v. 10). If we take the grace of God for granted, we not only miss the feast, we miss the fact that "many are called, but few are chosen" (v. 14). This text is from Jesus' final week before his crucifixion. The people see him as a prophet, a true messenger of God (Matthew 21:46), but soon he will suffer, be humiliated, and die. There will be false prophets who come along. They are like the guest who is not wearing the proper clothing and their message will be rejected. Our life in Christ will not be associated with messages and actions of hate, racism, prejudice or contempt for the poor. God's grace makes a difference in our lives and in the world in which we live. How does God's grace challenge your thoughts and actions toward people who are different from you?

*Pray: God of grace and mercy, cleanse us of our way of life that can become indifferent to the people you love through Christ our Lord. Amen.*

**SERVICE**

There is a theme this week about feasts and hospitality. Hospitality is receiving and treating guests and strangers in a warm, kind, and generous way. Think about what it means to show hospitality. Invite someone you may not know very well to your house for a meal.

**RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**

Psalm 23 is one of the most well-known scriptures in the Bible. This psalm is the shepherd David's song to God. David likens how a shepherd cares for sheep to how God loves each one of us. Write a list of ways a shepherd cares for sheep. Look at your list and think about God caring for you in these ways. *Pray: Lord, thank you for caring for me and leading me with love. Amen.*

WEEKLY MILESTONES

Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

**CARING CONVERSATIONS**

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- What is something you have accomplished and are proud of?
- How can God use your efforts—your deeds—for others?
- Is it a surprise that God can use your efforts to accomplish God's will on earth? Explain.

**DEVOTIONS**

*Read: Isaiah 45:1-7.*

Cyrus is a Persian king. He is not part of God's chosen people through Abraham, Isaac or Jacob. Cyrus doesn't even know the God of Israel, and yet Cyrus does God's will by setting God's people free to return home from exile in Babylon. Isaiah lifts up the supreme power and authority of God's rule throughout the world. Besides the LORD, there is no god (v. 5). All that is, is God's. It is easy for us to forget that God can use others outside of the body of Christ to do God's will on earth. No wonder Psalm 96 commands all the earth to sing to the LORD (v. 1). In the midst of the tragedies that happen all too often around us, it is important to remember that we are a people of hope and trust in the God who holds all things together. The Apostle Paul wrote with thanksgiving for the Thessalonians' faith, love, and hope (1 Thessalonians 1:3). As a chosen people, Paul gladly affirms that they do God's work of love on earth through their "work of faith" and "steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ" (v. 3). How does God's rule on earth give you hope and encourage you to act with love and faith?

*Pray: God of power and might, we thank you for your glory that breathes hope and love into all corners of the earth through Christ our Lord. Amen.*

**SERVICE**

God is the ruler of all of creation and we, God's servants, have responsibility to care for all that God has created. One of the greatest concerns for our world today is to care for the earth that is suffering under the weight of carbon emissions, overflowing landfills and polluted air and water. What can you do to reduce the waste that harms the earth?

**RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**

Psalm 96 is a song of praise to God. It tells of the sea roaring, the creatures and fields rejoicing, and the trees singing. In what ways do you praise God through sounds and music? Sing a favorite Christian hymn. Think about what the words say about God. Then say: **Sing a new song to the Lord! Everyone on this earth, sing praises to the Lord, sing and praise his name.** (vv.1-2a)

## UPDATE FROM BISHOP KATHERINE FINEGAN



Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod,

There has been some recent confusion on language from the Governor of the State of Michigan about recommendations regarding indoor event capacity in the UP. These matters certainly affect considerations for indoor worship services.

Per Executive Order 2020-176, the UP (Region 8) could have indoor events up to 25% of maximum capacity or 250 people, whichever is smaller. (Section 8)

A recent Executive Order 2020-181 seemed to indicate a reduction of that indoor capacity to 10 people statewide.

Later, the office of the governor clarified that this order 2020-181 does not apply to the UP (Region 8), since the UP is still in Phase 5 of the Michigan Economic Recovery Commission reopening plan. FAQs: <http://bit.ly/2020176FAQ> PRESS ARTICLE: <http://bit.ly/Indoor68>

Governor Whitmer, in a September 24 interview with TV6 Marquette, indicates that she does not intend to tighten restrictions in the UP, although she is concerned about the rising COVID cases in our area. TV6 Interview with the Governor: <http://bit.ly/MITVIncrease>

So, the 25% / 250 maximum at an indoor event remains the interpretation of capacities for indoor events in the UP.

Pastors and congregational leaders should continue to carefully discuss protocols regarding indoor worship. The science is clear that indoor venues pose a greater risk than outdoor venues all things being equal. You are encouraged to assess the size of your sanctuary space and the local context of COVID cases. There are many resources on the synod website for you to consider making your decisions. There is no mandate from the Bishop's office regarding your worship decisions, but recommendations have been offered as well-informed guidelines and they include the following:

- Abide by the local, state and CDC guidelines.
- Masks required.
- Maintain social distancing except among immediate family members.
- Track the names of people present in case contact tracing is needed.
- No congregational singing.
- No fellowship meals.
- No passing of the offering plate.
- Plan for possibility of multiple worship spaces if needed.
- Stay home if you have any symptoms at all or age and health put you in a high-risk category.
- Have your social conversations outside in the open air.
- Pray for your pastor and leaders who are continually monitoring the situation and making decisions.
- Talk with your insurance company for recommendations about assuring safety/minimizing liability.

As always, we hold the health and well-being of the most vulnerable among us as our highest priority. As schools open and then close again, as cases rise, we must continue to be vigilant. This requires no small amount of patience.

Thank you for your understanding as we take the time to find needed clarity with Governors' orders, mask mandates, and the best practices as put forth by reliable sources of information.

**WEEKLY MILESTONES**

Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

**CARING CONVERSATIONS**

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Talk or think about what it takes to have a strong, ongoing relationship with a friend.
- What gets in the way of a friendship?
- Talk or think about what it takes to have a strong, ongoing relationship with Jesus.

**DEVOTIONS**

Read: John 8:31-36.

It is the power of the word that Jesus brings that gives us freedom from sin. That word is first and foremost Jesus, the Word that became flesh (John 1:14). Christian disciples "continue" or remain in the freeing and saving word of God. The Gospel of John emphasizes that the follower of Jesus has an ongoing relationship to him by continuing "in my word" (8:31). To know the truth that sets one free is more than to know information; it is to live in a relationship to Jesus through faith. The challenge at the time of the Reformation—and today as well—is for the church to promote a living relationship with God, a relationship that depends on faith in Jesus, the Son of God. We experience this relationship through worship, prayer, reading the Bible, and serving and loving one's neighbor for the sake of Christ. How do you continue to live each day as a disciple of Jesus?

*Pray: Almighty God, help me to trust in Jesus Christ, your Son, our Lord and have life in his name. Amen.*

**SERVICE**

Martin Luther wrote, "God does not need your good works, but your neighbor does." An important theme of the Reformation is that all Christians are called to serve others through their baptisms. Think about friends and neighbors in your community who may need help or support in some way. What good works can you do to serve them in Jesus' name?

**RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**

Martin Luther wrote the words for *A Mighty Fortress Is Our God* and composed the melody. This well-known hymn is based on Psalm 46. After reading this psalm once, make a list of words from it that help you understand God as a mighty fortress. Read Psalm 46 again and pause for a moment when you read a word from your list. After finishing, say, "Amen."

I would meet with Anna for hours each day, discussing everything from **quantum physics** (*and its intersection with the tenets of Christianity*) to **bowling** (*with the pins representing the many redeemable and redeemed moments in our lives*). Below, is an excerpt from an article Anna wrote, specifically about these moments. I'm so thankful it captures the important parts of our conversation:

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*According to something called "process theology," in every single moment—as in every nanosecond, the tiniest sliver of time imaginable—**God is active**. God is active, and God is luring us into the next moment. That's the word process theologians use: **lure**. God knows what God wants to happen in the next moment(s), but God can't orchestrate it. If God could, then we would be nothing more than chess players on a board or actors on a stage. We'd have no autonomy and only passive roles in life.*



*Instead, process theology says that God lures us into the next moment according to **what God knows** has happened and is happening in that moment. Sometimes, like that big bass anglers hope to catch, we do actually catch the lure, and we are drawn into the next moment as God hopes we will be. And from that moment, in the same way, God lures us into the next intended moment **according to God's will**.*

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Think about those powerful words: we are **ACTIVELY LURED** by a God who walks WITH us, not some grand, puppet master who directs our moves. God wants to be in relationship with us. **US!**

Can you just picture Anna and I sitting in our lawn chair (*6ft apart, of course*) at 8:00am each morning, discussing things like this!? I pushed back when it came to terrible moments that I couldn't IMAGINE being able to be redeemed (*death, murder, adultery*), and she led me again and again toward how GOD has worked through EACH moment, not just the ones WE think were "good" or worth redeeming. We are to be in each moment...WITH God.

Having corresponded with Anna for years, it was great to finally learn side by side, and I'm already looking forward to when I can return and further explore these fascinating aspects of theology with her!
